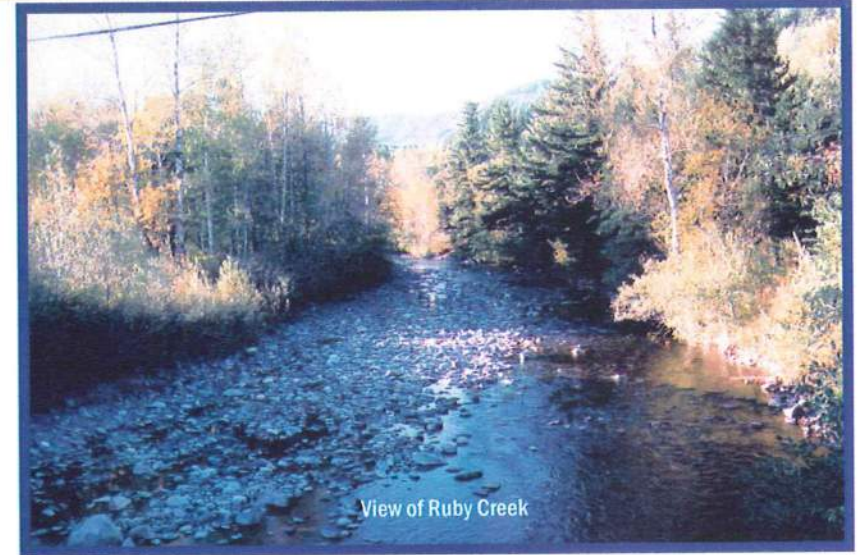
His family wishes to remember Lloyd's strong sense of family unity. We will always remember his broad smile when he was surrounded by his grandchildren.

to catch up to Lloyd's hectic pace of life.

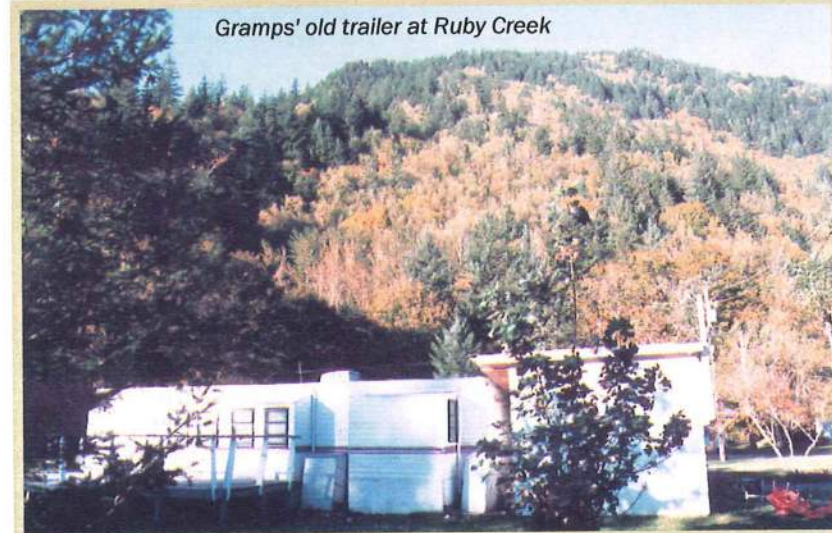
